### January Reflection: The Holy Name of Jesus

At that time, when eight days were fulfilled for the circumcision of the Child, His Name was called Jesus, the Name given Him by the angel before He was conceived in the womb.

St. Luke 2:21 - The Gospel of the Feasts of the Circumcision and of the Holy Name of Jesus

Students in the Fundamentals of Our Faith (FOOF) class will readily tell you that this Gospel is the shortest of all the Gospels read on Sundays or Holy Days in the Liturgical year. Simple and to the point, consider what more can be said for the most powerful name in the world:

In St. Bernard's 15th Sermon on the Canticle of Canticles, he says of the Name of Jesus: There is nothing that restrains the impulse of anger, calms the swelling of pride, heals the wound of envy, represses the insatiability of luxury, smothers the flame of lust, quenches the thirst of avarice, and dispels the fever of uncleanliness—as the Name of Jesus. For when I pronounce this Name, I bring before my mind the Man, who, by excellence, is meek and humble of heart, benign, sober, chaste, merciful, and filled with everything that is good and holy, nay, who is the very God Almighty—whose example heals me, and whose assistance strengthens me. ...Here I have my model, for he is Man; and my help, for he is God; the one provides me with precious drugs, the other gives them efficacy; and from the two I make a potion such as no physician knows how to make.

The cover image this month is an iteration of a monogram of the Holy Name of Jesus created by St. Bernardine of Siena in the 15th century, who first promoted the Feast of the Holy Name. He represents the Holy Name of Jesus surrounded with rays, forming a monogram of its three first letters, IHS.

Dom Prosper Gueranger explains that this design spread through Italy and in the early 16th century Pope Clement VI granted the Franciscan Order the privilege of keeping a feast in honor of the Holy Name of Jesus. In 1721 Pope Innocent XII extended the feast to the universal Church, and originally fixed the Second Sunday after Epiphany, but it was later moved to a day closer to the day of the event.

### Focus on Groups: The Holy Name Society



It seems appropriate in this month which is dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus that the Focus on Groups highlights arguably the most important men's apostolate at OLF: The Holy Name Society.

Historically, the Confraternity of the Most Holy Name of God and Jesus (known as the Holy Name Society) was formed in the early 15th century under the direction of the Dominican Order to help combat the Albigensian heresy. Its overall mission is to increase reverence for the Holy Name of God and Jesus, and is dedicated to making reparations for blasphemy, perjury, and immorality through the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy.

The Holy Name Society is one apostolate whose members, by example, work to restore love and respect for God's holy Name. OLF members of the HNS meet on first Saturdays after Mass and Benediction; and under the spiritual direction of Fr. Madanat, members grow in understanding the Faith, and deepen their love for the Holy Name of Jesus. By this, the HNS helps to create strong men of moral character equipped with the virtues to be leaders in their families, communities, and the world.

OLF HNS members are active in helping Father manage religious events like processions for solemn feast days and consult with him on improvement projects for the OLF physical plant. They lead the Rosary before Mass, and on the third Sunday of the month, HNS members receive Communion as a group and publicly recite the Holy Name Pledge after Mass.

As with all apostolates, the HNS is open to new members. If you are a man 18 years of age and older, you should consider enrolling in the HNS. Please see Fr. Madanat or HNS President Zach Brehm for more information.

### Putting the Two Great Commandments into Practice

As the new year unfolds we look for ways to become better versions of ourselves. For most worldlings it hones in on transient goals like losing weight, making more money, and finding new ways to get out of doing what is truly best for them so they can spend as much time as possible taking advantage of opportunities in pursuit of amusement and worldly trophies.

For Catholics, it should come down to the only activity worth pursuing: Following the Two Great Commandments. How can we find ways to love God more and our neighbor better? A good starting place might be to cultivate the qualities of honor and respect. Anonymous comments bravely left in the Registration Box boil down to three areas of concern:

- A great way to honor God is to respect His House. Since moving to the Vancouver location much time, money, and tremendous effort has been put into transforming it into something more Catholic in look and feel. There is proper church decorum and articles like the prayer books, missals, and even the pews should be used only for the purposes they fill.
- Making certain we are properly dressed for going to church honors God and shows respect for our neighbor. This is especially true so that no matter the situation, we are not scandalizing others or having them feel embarrassed by our dress and behavior.
- We are our "brother's keeper" to a certain degree, so keeping each other safe, especially children, should be a high priority. The current societal situation offers too many opportunities for our children to be exposed to harm. Parents and/or teenage siblings should accompany younger children to the restroom when there is an absolute need for them to leave Mass. Children should never be allowed to exit the building without someone with them (unless they are going to the playground where they are to stay until ready to leave).

It may seem harsh, but here it is spelled out:

- Treat things that belong to others (especially if they are used for God's honor and glory) with respect and in the ways they are to be used.
- Women, especially nursing mothers need to take extra care in dressing for church and in maintaining modesty when feeding their babies.
- Parents are responsible for keeping their children out of harm's way. No child should be sent to the restroom without a companion, and they are not to be running around the parking lot unattended.
- We do have serious reasons for calling all this out, rather than filling the bulletin with fluff.

Here is where the OLF Bookstore has you covered. Bookstore Manager Carol Wilber has in stock two options for your planning consideration:


One is a beautifully organized, hard cover, spiral bound, full-color planner that

The other is a "Professional Liturgical Planner" with a laminated paper cover. Larger than the other, it is still sleek enough to fit in a laptop case or backpack.




Both planners are on display in the Bookstore and are offered at less than what you will find at Angelus Press. Check it out to see which option is best for you.
